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



Strategy vision and aims



- The **vision** of this Strategy is 'for every individual, in every community, at every stage of life, to confidently engage with immunisation, supporting robust health for all Western Australians.'
- Aims to reduce the incidence of, or maintain elimination of, vaccine-preventable disease (VPDs) by:
 - improving immunisation access, acceptance, and increase demand and uptake
 - enhancing the systems that provide and support immunisation service delivery.

1.1.1	Engage individuals and communities to understand their experiences and motivations regarding access to immunisation.
1.1.2	Use data and modelling to understand immunisation trends and identify those at risk of delayed or under-vaccination.

Stakeholders adjust activities accordingly


Sustained progress continues

What is the monitoring and reporting framework?

- There are **2 components** to the framework:
 - Implementation monitoring how organisations are implementing the Strategy
 - Outcome reporting what has changed since the implementation of the Strategy
- **System-level** oversight of implementation, especially for priority populations and settings.




How is implementation monitoring conducted?



What is outcome reporting?

- Annually, key performance indicators (KPIs) will be reported against
- Allows progress to be monitored over time
- 35 KPIs were developed, aligned to the 5 priority areas
- First Annual Strategy Progress Report in 2026.



What has implementation monitoring revealed thus far?

- 2 periods of reporting
 - 87 activities Jul-Dec 2024
 - 240 activities Jan-Jun 2025
- Priority Area 1 most activities
- Additional reporting stakeholder in second round

Implementation monitoring: Priority populations

- Majority of activities =
 Aboriginal people,
 children and adolescents
- Least activities =
 transient populations and
 people living with
 disability
- Older adults require more targeted initiatives in 2026




Figure 1. Number of activities by priority population for January – July 2025 and July - December 2024

Implementation monitoring: Priority settings

- Majority of activities = primary health services
- Least activities = congregate living
- Congregate living settings require additional focus in 2026






Figure 2. Number of activities by priority setting for January – July 2025 and July - December 2024

How will implementation monitoring guide activities in 2026?




